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What advice can you offer to someone who is just getting started in your industry?

You've got to keep learning because the changes keep coming. Potential changes as of October 2019 include:

1. Reform of the NYS property tax system;

2. Changes to the ULURP process;
3. Additional rezonings (I see you Gowanus) and more.

Getting connected to your colleagues, through organizations such as REB-NY, NYSFAFH and other groups, is invaluable.
